




Number of Reports that Mention Vaccines by Month and Sentiment

Negative Sentiment February 2013 – February 2014









February Reports Containing Negative Vaccine Sentiment* (n= 91 alerts including duplicate reports; 4 % of all reports)



Special Focus: Some Indian Doctors Remain Concerned over Pentavalent Vaccine

Despite the Indian Minister for Health declaring the pentavalent vaccine was safe and not responsible for the deaths of any children, several media reports this month suggested that doubt remained among some pediatricians in India. In particular, some pediatricians called for stronger regulatory mechanisms to evaluate new vaccines for safety and efficacy before their acceptance into the government's universal immunization program (UIP).

In October 2013, the Indian National Technical Advisory Group on Immunization (NTAGI), conducted a study on vaccine-related infant deaths, and recommended to the Union Health Ministry that the vaccine was safe and effective. In October, the NTAGI recommended that the pentavalent vaccine, which was rolled out in Kerala for the first time in the country in 2011 and subsequently in seven other States, be introduced across the nation. The recommendation came after the national Adverse Events Following Immunization (AEFI) committee, which studied all infant deaths in various States cleared the vaccine of any cause in the deaths. Despite providing this reassurance that the vaccine is safe, debate continues between some vocal experts in the country. There is now a Supreme Court public interest litigation pending.

As pneumonia remains a major killer of children in India and the government supplied pentavalent vaccine offers dramatic cost savings and universal access to the vaccine, this public debate warrants close monitoring.
